WHEREAS, the Bristol Bay Economic Development Corporation (BBEDC) will provide Arctic Tern Program Grant funding in order to support and foster jobs, employment activities or learning opportunities for resident young people; and

WHEREAS, Curyung Tribal Council is looking for a resolution from the city government supporting the application; and

WHEREAS, Curyung Tribal Council is a duly organized governing entity, and eligible to participate in the BBEDC Arctic Tern Program; and

WHEREAS, the Curyung Tribal Council has elected to receive \$6,000 for the purpose of providing education and information to youth in Dillingham through the Carry the Cure program, which is culturally based and helps participants find the beauty in who they are, their culture and their native tradition through music and dance along with workshops and powerful messages and stories in ways that promote healthy lifestyles, and unity;



WHEREAS: the Curyung Tribal Council supports building assets, leadership skills, service work, and cultural knowledge to our youth; and,

WHEREAS: the Curyung Tribal Council acknowledges legal responsibility for assuring that all local, state and federal laws will be adhered to in any actions under this grant project: and,

WHEREAS: in accepting this grant, the Curyung Tribal Council agrees to indemnify, release, and hold BBEDC, its directors, officers, employees, contractors and agents, harmless from and against any disputes which might arise from activities and transactions performed or contemplated. This indemnity and release shall include costs and attorneys fees incurred by BBEDC in defending itself from any filed or threatened legal action related to this Grant or Agreement.

Total Amount Being Requested: \$6000.00

Brief Description of Project: To provide education and information to youth in Dillingham

Carry the Cure presentations are culturally based and help participants find the beauty in who they are, their culture and their native traditions. Presentations are led by one Native Alaskan and one Native American. Bill Pagaran is a Tlingit drummer from Palmer, AK; and Jonathan Maracle is a Mohawk vocalist, guitarist, and windflute player from Tyendinega, Ontario, Canada. Bill Pagaran a certified Alaskan secondary teacher. Bill is also a certified instructor of QPR (Suicide Prevention Gatekeeper Training). Most of the services offered will be given from a native perspective and will incorporate traditional values. Our nine-member team consists of highly qualified individuals, and includes trained counselors, teachers, pastors and professionals who have worked in public service fields for many years.

Purpose:

To share a traditional and contemporary blend of Native American music and dance, along with workshops and powerful messages and stories, in ways that promote healthy lifestyles, unity, and use of our traditional music and way of life in a modern world.

At least 450 youth in grades K-2 will be included in this project

3. Describe the work or activities that the youth are expected to accomplish.

1. Build Awareness to the suicide issue in a fun and interactive way. To eliminate the taboo that "talking about suicide makes it worse". To learn that talking about it, knowing the issues and knowing how to connect with your local and regional resources can save lives.
2. Encourage Students and build self worth through our "Committed to Life" school assembly. We had a fun interactive time with the students and taught them that, "No one is a whoops, accident or mistake. Every person has great value. Every person is to be valued. Every person has a purpose, and our villages are not complete without you. We are better together than apart. We need each others gifts, talents and voices to be seen and heard in order for us to have healthy villages."
3. Encouraging our Alaskan Native heritage through sharing in dance, music and art. Inviting shareholders to participate in group dances (round dance/friendship) and songs.
4. Give practical tips, tools and strategies for shareholders to be able to:
 - a. Know the warning signs of depression and suicide
 - b. Ask the tough questions of family, friends and others to find out if they are depressed or suicidal.
 - c. Know how to connect with resources in our villages and state; and refer those that are "at-risk" to counselors, therapists, tribal leaders, elders, clergy, teachers and crisis centers and helplines.
 - d. How to build a community safety net to prevent suicide that includes every member of each village from every walk of life. Suicide is everybody's business and "good friends don't keep deadly secrets".
 - e. Forgive others in order to live in freedom.
